In this film, a new enemy is faced; the Dark Star Empire. In the film the planet of Gamilon is totally destroyed. As a result the planet Iscandar is sent out of control plunging through space. After this Alex Wildstar and Starsha call Earth for help. As the Yamato (Argo) responds to their call, Desslok leads his small fleet into battle with the Dark Star Empire's fleet, this is because he has fallen in love with Starsha. When the Yamato arrives, the Empire's fleet is destroyed with the wave motion gun; word of this reaches into the heart of the Empire, and a huge mother ship is sent. 

THE STORY SO FAR, How the Starblazers Fan Club started, by Michael Pinto

Back in the Spring of 1980 "Starblazers" was taken off the air. This however was to start the Starblazers Fan Club. At first the club had only two members, which were Thomas Pignetti and I. We had started the club as a small attempt to get the show back on the air in the New York City area. That Spring little to nothing happened, we were far too small to get anyones attention. It soon looked to the both of us as the death of the club.

However as fate would have it that Summer I was involved in an art program in New York City.home of WNEW.which was the station that showed "Starblazers."At the program I met several other people that liked the show as much as I did. So one afternoon we all got together and called WNEW. With in the course of five minutes we had flooded the stations telephone lines. At one point several of us chanted into the phone, "bring Starblazers back!!!", this got us some attention. We soon started a petition. we got about 100 names, and we sent it in. Soon the program was drawing to an end. Then it came to me, why don't we keep in touch by a newsletter?Thus News-Line was born:

By Fall of 1980 most of us had lost touch. However the few that stayed in touch became founding members. Soon a paragraph appeared in the C/FO NY newsletter. From that we got about ten members. It was a start. Soon we took out an ad in Starlog and Astronomy. All we could do was wait.

Soon it was January of 1981, and our ads were published. Letter came in very fast. We had gone from 10 to about 60 members in one month. We then put out our first newsletter. We had card made out and the works. By early Feb. we had released our first News-Line. Then more members came in, we soon had 80 by early March.

As for now, we are about 110 strong. We now have members from Canada to Mexico. We are registered with the IRS and have a bank account. However the club never did what it set out to do, get Starblazers back in the New York City area. So from now on if you see that bit of New York in News-Line.it is because thats what we had originally had in mind for the club. But we are not complaining. If there is a moral it is this, "don't take anything lightly."
