Some good news, Star Blazers fandom or Blazerdom seems to be doing well at the conventions these days. In fact some fans have called this wave of convention activity the new wave in Blazerdom. In New York, the Star Blazers Mini Con drew crouds up to 100 at some points. There were speakers, video tapes, displays and costumes as well. In Michigan at Babelcon, the Star Blazers Micro Con also had a good croud too. At that convention there were video tapes, a panel on Japanese animation, costumes, a recording

room for people who wanted soundtracks and displays of Japanese merchandise.

At the Lunacon '83 convention, there will be a Star Blazers Room and a panel on Star Blazers. Both events at the convention are being organized by the same people who worked on the Star Blazers Mini Con (in fact some have gone as far as to nickname the future get together Star Blazers Conclave II). Lunacon '83 will be March 18 - 20th, and will be at the Sheraton Heights Hotel in Hasbrouck Heights, New Jersey. To get into the Star Blazers Room and see the panel you must have a membership to Lunacon. Memberships will be \$14 till 2/28/83, and \$17 at the door. Make all checks out to Lunacon '83. with having a room at the convention because it is one of the oldest SF cons on the coast.

On a similar note at the 41st World Science Fiction Convention, ConStellation to be held in Baltimore, Maryland, there will be a room devoted to Star Blazers. This convention will take place September 1st to the 5th of 1983. The fact that there will be a Star Blazers room at a Worldcon shows how far Blazerdom is coming. Details at this point aren't clear, but there is a chance that we might keep the room running the entire five days of the convention. Attending membership to the Worldcon is \$30 till 12/31/82. after that it gets higher. A word of advice, get tickets while they are at this price, tickets at the door to the last Worldcon (Chicon IV) were \$75. Write- ConStellation,

the Final Yamato, part 2

The revival of Captain Avatar, and the death of Derek Wildstar...?! The first one is a promise, the second is just a threat, and both are part of the prerelease hype and story hints for the Final Yamato movie.

Some surprising news is that the Final Yamato will be an immediate secuel to the first TV series. This splits the Yamato universe into three different lines of continuity—first there was the first series—Arrivederchi, then first series—second series—New Journey—Be Forever Yamato—third series, and now first series—Final Yamato!

In the last SEFR issue, a few pieces of the Final Yamato storyline puzzle were printed. Now with five months to go with the planned release date in March, many of the films details are still being keept secret. But some new bits of the storyline have been revealed:

The year is 2203 AD. The speed of the passing of Aquarius, a huge planet of water, has caused a galaxy nebula to undergo a dimension dislocation and end up overlapping our galaxy. Many of the stars collide, and spout hydrogen gas, infrared and Y-rays. Earth Defence Force, not use to such spectacular but messy phenomena, dispatches Space Cruiser Yamato to investigate.

Yamato under Captain Derek Wildstar, struggles through turbulent space to reach the overlapped galaxy. There they find Desslok's mechanical Garuman-Gamilon planet from the 3rd series. But Desslok's Palace, his paean to Iscandar, has been destroyed. Wildstar assumes Desslok has been killed and pays tribute. Suddenly, another planet careens into Desslok's, setting of tremendous explosions. Yamato can't out run the blast and is forced to "free warp" with no calculations.

At warps end, a very lost Yamato winds up with a ringside seat to see Aquarius drown the entire planet of Deingil. Fildstar send the Cosmo Hound, another refugee from the 3rd series, to save as many people as possible. But only one Deingilan, a small boy can be saved.

Wildstar wires the Earth Defence Force about Aquarius afraid Earth may suffer Deingil's fate someday, and Yamato leaves the drowned planet to try and find their way home. Suddenly a huge fleet accosts them. Aboard the mothership, Lugar II, son of Deingil's leader Lugar, takes Yamato for an enemy and attacks it with radioactive missiles that slice right through Ymato's armor. Radioactive rays speed through the ship, bringing down the crew one by one. Sandor has everyone put on their spacesuits...but when the rays hit the bridge, Wildstar is the only one who doesn't have his helmet on in time.

The radiation puts the rest of the crew in a syncopic state and Yamato plummets. But suddenly, an automatic operation defence system swithes on, and somehow guides the ship back to Earth.

Nova and Dr. Sane are on Earth all the while, rush on to Yamato as soon as the Yamato reaches home. Dr. Sane assures Nova that everyone who wore space suits would recover. Then she sees the helmet-less Derek, and breaks down. Nova then takes the gun and points it at her own chest...

Reportedly in a much later scent Wildstar is hovering between life and death. As for Avatar - his body is irreversably dead, so his sprit must be revived. But where? Is the automatic operation defence system really Avatar, living on the ship he loved so much? Or has his sprit gone inside Wildstar saving him from death? The answer is five months away!

the STAR BLAZERS MINI CON

August 28th and 29th marked a date to be remembered in Blazerdom. For it was on this date that the first big group of Star Blazers fans got together. Beforehand there were meetings of chapters of the Star Blazers Fan Club, but nothing on the grand scale. The gathering was held at the Creation Convention in New York City. While holding it at the Creation Convention had it's bad points (lack of equitment being given to us,ect.) but it also had it's good points as well (one of which was a good sized space for people who before had no experience running anything).

The program of the Star Blazers Mini Con was made up of several things. The major events the gathering featured was video tapes, several speakers, a slide show or two, poster displays and the assorted other stuff that goes

on at fan gatherings.

The video program was made up of several key American episodes, several Japanese episodes, and the Japanese movies which drew the biggest crouds of all. When the video first started, a group of people started singing the theme song from the show. Soon the entire group watching on Saturday started singing the theme song. There seemed to be some sense of unity that was there with everyone watching it. It's the sort of feeling one gets not sitting in front of a TV set at home, but the feeling one gets at the movies when the audience cheers on it's protaganist.

The Japanese movies shown were "Yamato the New Voyage" on Saturday, and "Be Forever Yamato" and "Arrivederchi Yamato" were shown on Sunday. The movie that drew the biggest croud was Arrivederchi. It got to the point where people were in the halls and even a few hucksters strayed from there tables to see what was going on. What made it more interested was that they were all watching

this on the TV monitor that the hotel rented out to us.

Little did the fans notice it, but in their own way they were helping out the show itself. While the huge crouds watched a photographer from Westchester Films was taking pictures. So in their own little way just by sitting their the fans did that little bit to save the show. Most of whom most likely didn't realize what was going on.

Outside the video, the next biggest attractions were the speakers. The speakers were Arnold Freedman from Westchester Films, Chris Henderson who wrote

for Questar magazine and Robert Greenburger from Comics Scene magazine.

Arnold Freedman who works for Westchester Films talked about the distribution of the show and Westchesters plans. In basic he informed fans what they could do to help save the show. He said the best way was to write the station a good typed letter, and not just one letter but many. According to Freedman the station is selling time to the advertisers, and the advertisers want big ratings. If we are to prove that the audience is out there, we have to show it...that was the basic message. He also said that it costs alot of money to produce a third season, and one thing fan mail does is encourage backers to invest. From Mr. Freedman's speech one got the impression that Westchester was 100% behind their product. After that he took audience question which ranged from questions about a movie verson, (it might interest some to know that at this point they don't own movie distribution rights, but if the support is there there is a good chance) to the stuff about what the average fan can do.

Robert Greenburger from Comics Scene gave his speech on coverage of the show. First off he told the croud that the publishers didn't care about how good the quality of the show was, even if it was better than half the stuff in Starlog, it still be covered in Comics Scene. One got the impression from the speech that he has little knowledge of the show, which made one question if they (Comics Scene) could cover the show. He didn't even realize that there was new stuff going on in Japan! However he told the fans that they could get by the policy changed, but they

would have to let the publishers of Starlog know. (the address of Starlog is tell them why you want it covered in Starlog, or why you feel it is a quality show).

The other speaker was Chris Henderson who wrote an article on the show for Questar magazine. His speech echoed alot of what Freedman said. However Chris had the unique appeal from speaking more from a fans point of view. His speech went over well, and ended with everyone cheering for the show and the speech.

In addition to the speakers there was also a slide show. Both slide shows didn't come out that good, but the organizers promise a better presentation at Lunacon. There were also poster displays and hucksters selling stuff related to the show. They had everything from buttons to records to models. There seemed to be a sence of ecitement in the air, that this was just a start to something bigger. (We urge all NY fans to write WPIX-TV,

please make all letters neat and typing helps too).



Comics are a single or series of panels with dialogue. They do have limitations brought on by that format, but claiming that they are unworthy of serious consideration for storytelling is fallacious and self-limiting.
